Sharyn Watson's Job Talk Club Meeting: 17 Oct 2018

Our Guest speaker was our own **Sharyn Watson.** She presented her Job Talk so that we can get to know her and her business a little better.

Sharyn is one of three female electrical contractors in Queensland.

She advised that If you get someone to do electrical work for your house they need to have an electrical contractor's license otherwise your house may not be insured if the workmanship is faulty.

Sharyn was not always in the electrical game although she has always been self employed. Her first business was a corporate training business. This business grew to 16 staff and they put through 250 trainees. A successful business.

After 10 years Sharyn and her husband Bernie were having a discussion at the kitchen table. Bernie was in the earth moving business but was actually a Sharyn floated the idea of qualified electrician. becoming an electrical contractor. Bernie advised her that women can't start electrical businesses and thought that was that. Sharyn who doesn't like being told she can't do anything took it as a challenge and in the background did all the training and achieved her electrical contractors license. So 6 months later at a pub Sharyn announced that she was now an electrical contractor and Bernie was to be their first employee. Bernie was a little surprised. Despite this, Bernie immediately took up the beer coaster and drew what he would like to be the logo of the business. This is what they still use today for Watmar Electrical.

So on Gumtree they advertised and their first client was a family up in Wynnum. Bernie and Sharyn, the "TA" drove from the Gold Coast to Wynnum not knowing what to expect but excited by their first job. The owner of the house let slip that he was the franchisee of the Good Guys on the Gold Coast and then indicated that he was looking for electricians to do the electrical work on new kitchen fit outs. So while Bernie was slaving away in the hot ceiling Sharyn negotiated and signed the contracts for what was to become many years work. And it was all meant to be.

The company believe in training young people. Their goal is to train 100 apprentices and they currently have 5 apprentices. 2 have already completed their training through Watmar and now work as qualified electricians for Watmar.



The company now also does Air-conditioning. They have 17 staff which includes 5 teams on the road. Each team has their own fitted out vehicle and consists of 2 people because the company believes that the risk in the industry necessitates having a second person on the job in case something goes wrong.

They also employ contract staff when things get busy.

The company does residential as well as commercial works. Lots of renovation work for houses as well.

Well done to our membership committee Martin, Sandy, Nigel and Janet. It was a well run evening with a great buzz about it.




Priscilla - Polio Barometer.

Professor Michael Good AO Club Meeting: 24 Oct 2018

Our club was honoured to have Prof Michael Good AO as a guest speaker last Thursday.

The room was packed with over 60 people to hear one of the worlds leading researchers in Malaria and infectious diseases.



Dr Good began by relating a story about how deadly malaria is in non-immune communities. In 1866 in the far north Queensland community of Bourketown a community of 76 people was cut off by flood. In that time they had an outbreak of malaria. Of the 76 people 50 people died. It is a very potent disease. These days we can treat the infection to ensure there is a high survival rate but there is no long term vaccine available for the population.

There are over 200 million cases of malaria in the world, of these 400,000 people die each year. 90% of those deaths are in Africa. Most of the deaths are in children under 5 years old. Pregnant women are also highly susceptible to the disease as they can lose their immunity while pregnant.

Malaria is a constantly changing parasite. Previous vaccines targeted a particular protein of a particular stage of the malaria cycle. Malaria however has many strains and changes frequently so vaccines have proved difficult to develop. Dr Good's team has developed a potential vaccine that can be effective against all strains of Malaria.

The new vaccine attacks the parasite when it is in the red blood cells of the victim. Trials on mice have shown that the vaccine can be very effective and now, thanks in part to rotary raising over \$500,000, the vaccine is in human clinical trials.

They have three volunteers at present and are looking for another 9 candidates to complete the first trial. They will be using three doses over three months. The strength of the does will be varied to help determine the best value dose to allow for a commercialization of an effective vaccine.

Dr Good thanked Rotary for their continued support and said that the project would not have advanced this quickly without their support.

PDG Graham Jones announced that Rotary is continuing fund raising to raise another \$500k to provide seed funding for the next set of clinical trials.
